THE HAND THAT ROCKS THE CRADLE RULES THE WORLD



Thomas Edison was born in Ohio. He was the seventh and last child of Samuel Edison, Jr. and Nancy Elliot Edison. His mother was a former schoolteacher; his father had many jobs, like running a grocery store to being a realestate agent (we can see how hard his father worked to take care of his family). Right from childhood he had a sense of curiosity and wanted to know the how and the why of things around him. His teacher used to think that he asked too many questions. She once remarked that education for Thomas was a sheer waste of time and money since he was slow at learning. His mother who had been a teacher accepted the challenge of making her son a success. Only she knew all about her son's thirst for knowledge. She always encouraged him to use his spirit of inquiry and love of doing things. Edison's parents loved to read. They read to him works of good literature and history. They had many books that young Tom enjoyed. Nancy Edison encouraged her curious son to learn things for himself. His parents were dedicated to teaching their children. They did not force him to learn about things he didn't enjoy. So he learned about things that interested him the most. He learned education was his own responsibility (we can see how responsible Thomas was). He learned to be persistent. He learned that education is something that lasts your whole life (**Do we study to satisfy our parents or for our own sake?**).



When Thomas was nine Nancy Edison gave him an elementary science book. It explained how to do chemistry experiments at home. Edison did every experiment in the book. Then Nancy gave him more books on science. He soon loved chemistry and spent all his spare money buying chemicals from a local pharmacy (**Thomas used his spare money so wisely-How many of you really do that?**). He collected bottles, wires, and other items for experiments (we see that he followed- Reduce, Reuse, Recycle).

Since Thomas showed so much liking in chemistry she set up a laboratory at home for him. To make both ends meet, Thomas used to sell newspaper on trains between Detroit and Port Huron (**He was so thoughtful and understanding that his parents are spending so much money for him**). In gratitude for saving his son from being run over by a car, a gentleman named Mackenzie taught Thomas Telegraphy. Thomas mastered Telegraphy at the age of sixteen and became an operator in Ontario.



He made great invention Telegraphy and other similar fields. For the ingenuity (clever) and quickness that he displayed in his inventions like the Gramophone, the improved telephone and the incandescent light, people started calling him "The Wizard" (A man who has magical powers).

His success was mainly due to the vast knowledge that gained by reading books and as well as proper management of time. His mother inculcated these qualities in him during his childhood.



The story of Helen Keller



Helen Keller was born in 1880, June 27th, in Tuscumbia Alabama. She was a normal healthy child at birth, but when she was 19 months old she suffered from a strange disease leading to loss of sight, speech, and hearing. Helen struggled to articulate her needs, emotions and thoughts, but could not do so in any way. Out of shear distress she used to throw tantrums or burst into tears clinging to her mother desperately. Because of her inability to communicate with those around her effectively, she became a wild and destructive child. (Imagine a situation when you cannot speak or hear or see, and find it extremely difficult to express about anything going on within you).



Yet she also showed such signs of intelligence, contriving over sixty signs to indicate what she wanted, that her mother was determined that she could learn to communicate with others. Helen would feel people's hands to try to find out what they were doing. She learned to do many things this way. She learned to milk a cow and knead the bread dough.

She could recognize people by feeling of their faces or their clothes. She made up signs with her hands so she could "talk" to her family. She had 60 different signs. If she wanted bread, she pretended to be cutting a loaf. If she wanted ice cream, she would hug her shoulders and shiver. Helen had an amazing memory, and she also had skills very few people have ever been able to develop. She could put her fingers to a person's lips and understand the words which were being spoken.



In March, 1887, when Helen was a few months short of her seventh birthday, Anne Sullivan came to her home as her teacher. Miss Sullivan herself had been blind, but had an operation and regained her sight. She understood what Helen was feeling. Helen was to forever call this day "The most important day of my life". From that fateful day, the Anne and Helen were inseparable.

Miss Sullivan gave her a doll. By spelling "d-o-l-l" into the child's hand, she hoped to teach her to connect objects with letters. Helen quickly learned to make the letters correctly, but did not know she was spelling a word, or that words existed. In the days that followed she learned to spell a great many more words in this uncomprehending way.

One day she and "Teacher" (as Helen always called Anne Sullivan) went to the outdoor pump. Miss Sullivan started to draw water and put Helen's hand under the spout. As the cool water flowed over one hand, she spelled the word "w-a-t-e-r" manually into the other hand. Suddenly the signals had meaning in Helen's mind. It was here that Helen learned that everything had a name and that the manual alphabet was the key to everything she wanted to know.

She eventually stopped having the tantrums. Anne taught her for years. Helen learned to read Braille. This was a system of raised dots representing letters. A blind person could read by feeling of the dots.



When she was just ten, Helen expressed a desire to learn to speak. Somehow she had found out that a little deafblind girl in Norway had acquired that ability. Her seeking and determination was not lost on the universe, for another teacher was to enter her world and take her further.

Even when she was a little girl, Helen Keller said, "Someday I shall go to college." And go to university. In 1898 she entered the Cambridge School for Young Ladies to prepare for Radcliffe College. She entered Radcliffe in the fall of 1900 and received her Bachelor of Arts degree. Throughout those years Anne Sullivan was always by her student Helen's side.

Her teacher commended the qualities of determination and the love of perfection in Helen. Even at the age of 7 she never dropped her task until she mastered it completely and she would not learn a lesson until she understood it totally. Helen was self disciplined, high spirited, self- assured, and had a strong will of her own. Anything that was more difficult excited and interested her. Her disabilities drove her to the deeper levels of will power.

She had a fixed determination to regard the world as a place of brightness of free expansion and of irresistible action. She used to often say, "I seldom think about my limitations, and they never make me sad"

As an adult, she travelled the world, gave speeches, and authored many books and essays. Helen became a prominent figure whose accomplishments attracted awe, respect, admiration and inspiration. While she was in college she wrote her book called "The Story of My Life". With the money she earned from the book she was able to buy a house.

It was only through her determination that Helen not only overcame the physical challenges of speech and hearing disability but also the formidable social obstacles that people with such disadvantages face.





Spiritual Definition of Truth

 Truth - Being straightforward in speech and conduct, behaving sincerely; following through on one's promise



The Story of Mahatma Gandhi



Gandhi earned the appellation of "Mahatma: the great soul" because of his noble character and adherence to truth. Gandhi has said, "Truth alone will endure; all the rest will be swept away before the tide of time." He learnt the importance to human values, truth, love, peace, non-violence and right action from his parents. Gandhi's mother used to observe everyday a vow ritual known as "Kokila Vratha". As soon as she completed the ritual, she would wait for the call of the Kokila (the Indian cuckoo) to have her breakfast. However, on one day she waited for a long time, without taking food, for the call of the cuckoo. Noticing this, the young Gandhi went out of the house, imitated the cooing of the cuckoo and then told his mother, "Now that the cuckoo has made its call, please, mother, take your food." Unable to contain her grief, the mother slapped on the cheeks of Gandhi and wailed: "Oh Lord! What sin have I committed that such a liar should be born to me! What a great sinner am I to have begotten such a wicked liar as son?" She was shedding tears as she spoke. Deeply moved by his mother's words, Gandhi made a promise to her "In my life, henceforth, I will not utter falsehood."

In those days, the mothers used to watch the behavior of their children and strove to keep them on the right path. Gandhi became a 'Mahaathma' because of the severe punishment meted out to him by his mother.

In Swami's own words...



Swami says: The first quality is Sathyam. "Sathyameva Jayathe", says the Upanishad (Truth alone Triumphs).

What is this Truth? It is adherence to what is true in thought, word and deed. Often many untoward situations arise which render such adherence difficult. Children, for instance, out of fear of punishment or scolding by parents or teachers indulge in prevarication or falsehood and avoid admitting the truth. This tendency results in due course in vitiating their entire life by making them lead double lives. Having regard, therefore, to their future, they should learn from their boyhood to admit their mistakes and speak the truth. There is nothing wrong if they are punished by their parents or teachers for their misdeeds. Through such corrective measures, they will learn to behave properly in their later years. If from the beginning you learn to speak the truth, you will find it easy. But once you take to lying, to return to the ways of truth is very difficult. Hence, when you are still young and your minds and hearts are pure and untainted, you must cultivate the habit of sticking to truth. By speaking the truth always, your minds will be filled with good thoughts. You should not give up truth, whatever difficulties you may encounter, whatever troubles or trials may come your way. Material prosperity or positions of authority may come and go. But the reputation for truth and integrity will last forever. If you install truth and righteousness in your hearts, your lives will become eminently meaningful and worth


Story (cont...)
